A safe and secure campus

Drake University is proactive in one of its most important goals — ensuring the safety and security of our students and campus community.

Our mission: a safe, secure campus

The mission of Drake Campus Security is to provide a safe and secure environment for students, faculty, staff and campus visitors.

Drake Security strives to achieve this mission through a community-friendly approach that enhances safety through the visibility of security personnel, preventive patrols, 24-hour accessibility, positive conflict resolution, and crime prevention and awareness programs. Drake Security collaborates with local law enforcement and community organizations in fulfilling its mission.

In addition to their role in keeping the campus community safe, Drake Security officers also are trained to assist in medical emergencies and have access to portable defibrillators for use in emergency situations.

Our MO — safety first!

Drake Campus Security is one of the largest private campus security forces in the state of Iowa, consisting of 20 full-time officers who patrol the campus around the clock and throughout the year. A computerized communications/dispatch post is staffed 24 hours a day to coordinate security activities.

Campus Security officers undergo regular, mandatory training under the direction of certified law enforcement professionals, including an initial 30-day training period that includes areas ranging from conflict resolution and use of force to diversity and CPR.

Our security force conducts routine patrols to enhance the safety of our campus by deterring crime before it happens. Security officers work closely with the Des Moines Police Department in preventing crime in our surrounding neighborhood and, when necessary, making arrests and investigating crimes.

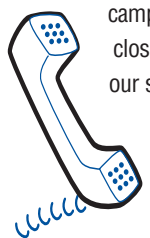
The presence of the Des Moines Police Department Traffic Unit is another strong deterrent to crime on or near the Drake campus. Housed in a University-owned building on Forest Avenue, the DMPD Traffic Unit facilitates direct interaction between the DMPD, Campus Security, members of the Drake community and citizens in the surrounding neighborhood.

Smile! You're on Camera

Drake University uses a number of CCTV smart cameras, monitored and recorded 24/7, to enhance safety in student parking lots and other exterior locations.

“Who you gonna call? 811!”

A total of 50 security phones that connect directly to Campus Security are located inside buildings and in heavily traveled outdoor locations across campus. You also are encouraged to call Campus Security from the residence halls and campus offices whenever you observe something that concerns you.



Keeping your campus home safe

Front desk receptionists are on duty in every Drake residence hall 24 hours a day. All hall doors are locked at night and the main doors are locked at 11 p.m. If you or a guest enters any residence hall — even your own — after 11 p.m., you must present identification.

Any guest must be accompanied at all times by a hall resident. You must leave your Drake ID card or driver's license with the receptionist when visiting a residence hall other than your own. To be admitted to other campus buildings after business hours, you may also be required to show your ID to a monitor — not to hassle you, but to protect your safety.

Protecting your personal safety

- **Call Campus Security.** No matter how trivial an incident seems, or how harmless an unknown visitor appears, call Security any time of the day or night. The emergency number is 811 and the non-emergency number is 2222.

- **In case of fire or if an ambulance is needed,** you should first call the Des Moines emergency number, 9-911, from any campus phone. Follow that call with a call to Drake Security. You should have your street address available when you call the Des Moines emergency number. If you need help in contacting Security or any public authorities, ask your resident assistant or a University administrator.

- **Three's a crowd.** Don't walk alone. Muggers and thugs don't like company. Walk close to the curb, away from bushes, alleys or driveways. Stay in well-lit areas when walking at night and call a friend for an escort if necessary. If you must walk alone, let someone know when to expect you.

- **Keep yourself in the dark.** Always pull your curtains or shades after dark. Never dress or undress in front of windows.

- **Keep good company.** Think you're being followed? Head immediately for a heavily used area. If you're close to a building with people inside, go in and stay awhile. Call Security.

Protecting your stuff

- **Locks don't work unless you use them.** Most thefts on campus occur in unlocked rooms. If you have a problem with your lock, report it immediately to residence services.

- **Keep your eyes peeled.** If you see someone suspicious in your residence hall or office building, ask what he or she is doing or call Security. Salespeople are not allowed in the residence halls, and a hall resident must accompany all non-Drake visitors.

- **Keep an eye on your laundry.** Clothing can be removed during laundry cycles. If you use off-campus laundry facilities, don't go alone or late at night.

- **Caution is key.** Don't leave your keys lying around. Don't lend them to anyone. Don't leave copies under a mat, behind a desk or in your mailbox. If your keys are taken, report the loss to your residence hall director at once. You can get new keys and have your locks changed for a fee.

- **Make your mark.** Operation Identification at Drake helps you identify your belongings. Just call the Des Moines Police Department for an identification number and then engrave it on your property. Police can use the number to identify stolen property as yours and return it to you. Drake will supply an engraver. Ask your resident assistant for more information.

Be responsible — to yourself and to others

If you are robbed or attacked, report it. When you call Drake Campus Security, describe what you've seen or heard. Give the address and location of the incident, the number of people involved, descriptions of the people, details and circumstances, and the license numbers and descriptions of any vehicles involved.

It's important to report a crime, no matter how insignificant it seems. Sometimes police can fit your problem into a pattern developing in the city. Reporting a crime is the only way to keep the same person from hurting or stealing from someone else.

If you intend to report a theft to your insurance company, you must file a police report.

Know the law

Alcohol and controlled substances

Drake University believes that it cannot deny persons of legal age the right to use alcoholic beverages, but sees a responsibility to prevent the abuse of drinking privileges by expecting students to behave in a legal and responsible manner where the use of alcoholic beverages is concerned.

All federal, state and local laws regarding the unauthorized use, possession, distribution or sale of any alcoholic beverages and controlled substances are in effect on the Drake University campus. Drake University provides education and counseling regarding drug abuse.

A complete description of the University's policies regarding alcohol and substance abuse may be found in the Student Handbook. Faculty and staff members should contact the Director of Human Resources for a complete description of the appropriate policies pertaining to them.

Sexual abuse

A complete description of the University's policies regarding sexual abuse, including procedures for reporting sexual abuse and preserving evidence, can be found in the Student Handbook.

Drake University strongly encourages victims of sexual abuse (including date rape) to report the incident to the authorities and to file a campus disciplinary complaint. Upon the request of a victim of sexual abuse, Campus Security will help the student notify the Des Moines Police Department. Faculty and staff members should contact the Director of Human Resources for a complete description of the appropriate policies and procedures pertaining to them.

Counseling for sexual abuse victims is available through the University's counseling center as well as through services such as First Call for Help and Victim Services, both of which are listed on the back of this brochure. Upon the request of a victim of sexual abuse, changes can be made to the victim's academic, living and work situations to the extent such changes are reasonably available. In addition to possible civil and criminal procedures, Drake may initiate disciplinary procedures and possible sanctions. See the Code of Student Conduct section within the Student Handbook.

Sex offender registry

The Federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act requires that colleges and universities advise their campus communities where law enforcement agency information provided by a state concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. The Act also requires sex offenders already required to register in a state to provide notice, as required under state law, of each institution of higher education in that state at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation, volunteers services or is a student.

A registry of sex offenders who have been determined to be of high or moderate likelihood to re-offend is maintained by the State of Iowa at: www.iowasexoffenders.com. For more specific information or to find out which offenders have indicated they attend or are employed by Drake, please contact Sgt. WARNING: The information on the Iowa Sex Offender Web site and the information available to the Des Moines Police Department may be inaccurate, out-of-date and/or incomplete. Reporting to the registry is voluntary on the part of sex offenders. In addition, budget constraints have prevented the sex offender registry from being kept up to date.

Weapons and dangerous substances

The use or possession of firearms, ammunition, explosives, fireworks, incendiary devices, BB guns, imitation guns or any dangerous weapons, substance or material on campus is prohibited except as expressly authorized by the University.

Damage or destruction to Drake property by use of fire or explosives

Pursuant to the Safe Explosives Act, 18 U.S.C. 844(f), persons who maliciously damage or destroy, or attempt to damage or destroy, by means of fire or explosive, any building, vehicle or other property owned by a college or university receiving Federal financial assistance (such as Drake University) may be imprisoned for not less than five years and not more than 20 years, plus receive a fine, or both. If personal injury occurs, then the sentence rises to seven to 40 years, plus a fine, or both. If the conduct causes the death of another, then the perpetrator can be subject to the death penalty, or imprisoned for not less than 20 years to life, fined or both.

Off-campus organizations

Drake Campus Security cooperates with the Des Moines Police Department in monitoring and recording any criminal activities at off-campus student organizations, such as fraternities and sororities, or by members of such organizations.
