Psychology Major Requirements

The Psychology Department offers two major degree programs: a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) and a Bachelor of Science (B.S.). Each of these requires 39 hours of coursework within the Department of Psychology. In addition, the B.S. requires 12 hours of additional coursework outside of the department (see back of this form).

Notes:

Students must pass PSY 11 and PSY 13 (or equivalent) with a "C" grade (not C-) or better to major in psychology and to take any upper level courses for which PSY 11 and PSY 13 are prerequisites.

Students complete 16 hours of upperdivision coursework in psychology. These hours exclude all non-capstone independent studies, research seminars, and internships.

At least one course must be completed in each of the following four areas. A theme may be filled by a lab course.

B.S. Non-Psychology Course Requirement

An additional 12 hours of coursework must be successfully completed in natural science courses outside of the Department of Psychology. These courses include Astronomy, BCMB, Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Environmental Science, Mathematics (20 or above), Physics, select HSCI courses, and NSCI courses not cross-listed with Psychology.

Note: 8 of the 12 hours must be from courses that include a laboratory component.

Capstone Options:

Students should work closely with their faculty advisors to find an appropriate psychology capstone experience to fulfill the requirements of the Drake Curriculum (To be counted as a capstone, the experience must be the equivalent of 3 credit hours, and cannot be taken as pass/fail) No experience should be considered "approved" until the student has consulted the faculty advisor.

Note: occasionally, faculty may offer a senior seminar on a topic of current interest in psychology. Active

participation in discussion and substantial written work will be required of seminar students.

Capstone Courses	Research Experience (PSY 190C, PSY 191C)	Internship (PSY 192C)	Group Projects
Courses designated as senior capstone experiences (History and Systems of Psychology – Psy 151, and Applied Professional Ethics in Psychology – Psy 145) may complete the capstone requirement.	A student may, with faculty guidance, complete and independent scholarly project. This project may be empirical or theoretical in nature, and must result in a scholarly product at the end.	A student may work in a setting relevant to his/her interests in psychology a minimum of 10 hours a week for at least one semester. Important Notes

- Of the 39 credit hours in psychology required for the major, 18 credit hours that do not include independent study, research seminars, or internships must be taken at Drake. A minimum of 9 of these must be upper-division psychology credit hours.
- 2. Students may take both STAT 71 and STAT 72 or BIO 140 as substitutes for PSY 11. These students will need to take additional credit hours in psychology to reach the 39 hours of Psychology coursework needed for the major.
- 3. Students who are interested in graduate school in psychology are encouraged to take History and Systems (PSY 151), Independent Study (PSY 90/91 or PSY 190/191) and participate in a Research Seminar (PSY 198). These courses will count towards the Arts and Sciences degree. Additional courses strongly recommended for majors with GPAs of 3.00 and above who are interested in graduate study: Advanced Statistics (PSY 111) and two laboratory courses: one human, one animal.
- 4. Independent Study/Internship: A maximum of 6 credit hours of independent study and/or internship may be counted toward the 39 hours required for the major.
- 5. Travel Study Seminar (PSY 194) and Topical Seminar (PSY 95 and PSY 195 courses count toward the Psychology major.
- 6. Students are encouraged to take courses in the Arts and Sciences that will improve their verbal, quantitative, and critical reasoning skills.
